

Dear Chapter Presidents,

The AOG continues to <u>monitor the Coronavirus</u>. Our main priority is making sure everyone stays safe and healthy. We appreciate how patient everyone has been.

This situation is different than anything we have experienced. While you will be limited on what you can do for your Chapters, you can still keep everyone connected, support your local graduates and their families, and be a force for service. Below are some resources and ways you can help and stay connected during this time.

• Second. Third. and Fourth class cadets have been sent back to their

home towns. Due to this decision many cadets are navigating being back home and online school. During this time where we are practicing social distancing, we still want to support our grads and cadets virtually. If you haven't sign up on <u>ZoomieLink</u> we highly recommend you and your chapter members to sign up. On this platform cadets are being encouraged to reach out to grads in their community to make sure they have someone to talk to, get advice from, stay connected, etc. while they're away from USAFA in upcoming weeks or months. Attached is a guide to help you get signed up on ZoomieLink and how to connect with grads and cadets virtually.

- Many people are now quarantined. It certainly gets lonely staying home. Many, especially your most vulnerable graduates, could be secluded for a long period of time. They could really use a call to check in on how they are doing. Think about splitting up your Chapter roster and check in on everyone.
- While we urge you not to visit with each other, offering to drop off groceries, supplies, or medications on the front step for some of your more vulnerable constituents is okay as long as you take precautions and you are not sick.
- This is a great opportunity to get your Chapter more involved with your community and be a force for service. Collect canned foods or supplies for the local food banks (keep your distance when dropping off) – this would be consider hosting a service related event for Distinguish status.
- Many schools are closing, but the parents are still working. Homeschooling and working is not going to be easy! You can help virtually assist them by video tutoring the kids through their schoolwork while the parents make dinner, or in some rare instance, helping with childcare.
- Small business owned by graduates are taking a huge hit during this time.
